History: Theory, Concept and Ancient Indian Historiography

Course Objectives

Students will extend their abilities to:

Questions shall be uniformly distributed from the entire syllabus. The previous year paper/model paper can be used as a guideline and the following syllabus should be strictly followed while setting the question paper.
